I have no doubt that all of us who saw the TV news this week reacted in a similar manner to the horrific dash-cam footage of the accident that occurred outside Marryatville High School. All of our prayers go out the young people so tragically injured, and to their families. These are sobering experiences to witness and remind us of the responsibility we all carry as drivers of motor vehicles, especially in areas around schools where young people are moving about in such large numbers. It provides a timely opportunity for us all to think about our movement in motor vehicles around our own College community, and how easy it is to drift above safe speed limits and become distracted in a manner that can have such potentially catastrophic consequences. Thank you for all you do to ensure the safety of your children, and other members of our community's children, on a day-to-day basis as they are coming to and leaving school.

Teachers are looking forward to these conversations with parents/carers and students, as an opportunity to discuss successes already achieved and to set learning goals for the remainder of the semester.

Learning Reviews are one way the College seeks to provide continual updates on student learning progress. Teachers also use SEQTA and Seesaw (in the Junior School) as ways of communicating and providing students with feedback about their learning and ways to continue to improve.

All families should now have access to SEQTA Engage and I encourage you to check your child's progress regularly throughout the year and to discuss their classes, upcoming assessment tasks and teacher feedback with them.

Year 7 Reflection Day

At our College we use the theme of 'ecological conversion' for our Year 7 Reflection Day, which explores the Pope's message in his encyclical, Laudato Si, and gives the students a very practical engagement with the natural world.

We recently held our Year 7 Reflection Day at Laratinga Wetlands as a way to assist the students coming into secondary school with

their transition and to help them form connections with each other and the natural environment. Kim Thompson from Environmental Connections co-facilitated the Reflection Day with us, and each of the three Year 7 classes rotated through three activities, including a Prayer Labyrinth exercise where students had the opportunity to form a mini labyrinth using air dry clay; a bid identification session through the wetlands with Fr Richard and Kim Thompson; and a team building exercise to reinforce the importance of working together to achieve a common goal. The theme of the day was 'Go the extra Mile', based on the scripture passage from Matthew 5:38-42, and the students were able to reflect upon how they 'go the extra mile' for others and for the natural environment.

Term 2 CESA-Mission Australia - Place-based Session



7-12 Highlights



Year 10 Coorong Camp

On the 6 March, our Year 10 students set off for the Coorong for our annual camp; this is an account of our adventures...

Monday 6 March

All students gathered at 8am (or slightly before) at the College, eagerly awaiting our departure. We packed the buses and the girls set off for Long Point, while the boys headed to Goolwa Beach.

The girls group arrived at Long Point and began setting up for their first day of kayaking. The conditions were challenging and resulted in only approximately 4km being covered in the space of about 2 hours. Several students, and one teacher (Mikaela Thomas), required the assistance of the Wilderness Escapes staff to tow them for part, or all, of the journey, but the group made it in one piece to their first camp site; Mark's Point. This is not the usual location for the first night of the girls' camp, but due to the challenging conditions, crossing the width of the Coorong wasn't possible, so a site on the same side as Long Point was chosen. A challenging day, but also an opportunity to build resilience, demonstrate our Heart Value of Perseverance, and share the tough experience with friends.

The boys' group were required to take the scenic route to Goolwa Beach due to a detour just outside of Strathalbyn, but when we arrived the boys were all quick to (wet)suit up and enter the water, dodging the dead fish on our way to the breakers. Significant skill was demonstrated in challenging conditions, with rain, sun and wind all needing to be accounted for. The boys threw themselves into the activity and got out of the water after a couple of hours just in time to experience a downpour, just as they were trying to get dry. After drying off, it was back on the bus for a short trip to Hindmarsh Island, where we packed bags and were then ferried across the water to The Young Husband Peninsula, where we hiked a short but challenging walk through the dunes to our first campsite at Barker's Knoll.

After dinner and a rain interrupted night walk, we all retired to our tents relatively early, for what would be an eventful night.

Tuesday 7 March

Conditions in the area did not improve overnight, in fact they became significantly more hazardous for kayaking, so a decision was made that the girls would not be able to get on the water at all on this day. So, the girls groups spent the day taking in some of the local sights of the area, including a nature walk, a trip to the (not so)-pink lake and then taking in the excitement and thrill of the bustling metropolis that is Meningie. A pay phone at Meningie proved to be a popular activity during the day and many-a-call home to parents were made to let them know about the crazy adventures the girls had already had. After some time lazing in the Meningie park, and making use of the luxurious public toilets, it was back to Mark's Point for the remainder of the day, where the only toilets consisted of a shovel and a hole in the ground.

The boys began their day at 1:05am, when it became apparent that the tide had risen to such an extent that our entire camp site was about half a foot deep in water. All the group did an outstanding job of quickly getting as many tents and belongings as possible into the higher ground of the dunes. After stringing up some make-shift tarpaulin shelters in the dunes, the boys then put on the dry clothes they had and tried to get some sleep, or in most cases, just patiently waited for the sun to rise so we could get moving and start drying our equipment. A decision was made that the best drying spot would be back on Hindmarsh Island, so we could take shelter if it rained while we waited for our belongings to dry. So, the group were ferried back to Hindmarsh Island via tinny, where a bakery lunch made the task of waiting for things to dry slightly more appealing. Once belongings had been dried for as much time as we could spare, we were back on the boats, where we were taken to our campsite for the evening, Snake Pit. By about 7:30pm, we had all the group back together, ate dinner and went to bed early after a very long and tiring day.

Wednesday 8 March

The weather improved significantly on the Wednesday, meaning the girls could get on the water in their Kayaks and make the crossing over the Coorong in relatively calm waters, making the experience far more enjoyable than their paddling experience on the first day of camp. The girls spent the morning kayaking to our cross over point, where the boys and girls groups would meet to swap kayaks for backpacks and vice-verca, and to swap stories from the experience so far. The boys got going on their walk to the crossover point with their backpacks significantly lighter than on day one due to making their way through most of their food and water. This made carrying packs much easier than on the Monday, so although this walk was about three times longer than the one earlier in the week, it was easier due to the lighter packs. Also, the prospect of seeing the girls group at the crossover point enlivened the spirits of several of the boys, with Elliot Duffield demonstrating significant excitement as we approached the end of our walk.

After eating lunch, the boys and girls groups swapped activities and, after some difficulty squeezing all their belongings into the backpacks, the girls set off on their walk for the afternoon, while the boys packed their kayaks and set off for their first paddle. Conditions for the Wednesday afternoon were not as favourable as the morning, with rain and wind impacting both groups on their way to their respective camp sites. The choppy conditions in the Coorong made landing at the boys' camp site quite difficult, with some boats becoming tangled and Krisitan Cooper having an unfortunate capsizing accident. The shovel got a workout on the Wednesday evening after dinner, before students retired to their tents for a well-earned rest.

Thursday 9 March

The girls' group had their big walk on the Thursday, making their way through the dunes to the Southern Ocean side of the Young Husband Peninsula, before walking along the beach and then cutting back into the dunes and making their way to their camp site at Barker's Knoll. Some of the group found the walk with the heavy packs hard going, but all completed the walk and enjoyed the coastal scenery along the journey. The girls learnt from the boys' mistake from earlier in the week, and set up camp on higher ground in the dunes, rather than on the flatter ground of the camp site itself. This proved to be an unnecessary precaution as the area wasn't flooded at all on the Thursday night, meaning that the high tide the boys experience on their first night was either a freakish event for this time of year, or the result of activity at the barrages, rather than because of tidal activity.

The boys had flat and calm conditions for their big day of paddling, and most of our paddle was completed in the morning. We stopped at some of the largest dune systems along the Coorong for our morning tea, and then, after some intense dune-long-jumping competitions, which saw Tyler Smith crowned as King of the Dunes, we walked through the dunes, taking in the incredible and unique views, making our way to the Southern Ocean, where the boys played some make-shift beach cricket and collected several kilos of cockles for their dinner. After lunch we made the short paddle to 9-Mile-Point, our final camp site for the week, where we set up camp, cooked dinner and then played some games, including spot-light and an interesting survival style test of strength game between some of the boys, which involved tea-towels and for some reason, no tops.

Friday 10 March

The final day of camp started with a short walk and a boat trip in the tinny for the girls' group, after which they were bused from Hindmarsh Island to Goolwa Beach for their surfing session. Several of the girls were too exhausted by this stage to get in the water, but for those who did, the conditions were the best of the week. The boys had a short paddle across the Coorong before breakfast and packing up the kayaks and all other equipment, then making the short drive to Meningie for lunch and some relaxing in the park. Then both boys and girls groups then made their way back to school, where we unpacked and swapped stories with each other and the parents who had come to collect their children. The camp was challenging due to the conditions, but this is a part of the experience and all who attended gained something from the trip, and many indicating that, despite the conditions and the flooding, they'd still do it all over again if they had the opportunity.

A big thanks to Jo Matthews, Mikaela Thomas and Harry Cates for attending the camp; without these staff the camp would not have happened. Another big thanks to the parents/carers of all students who attended; helping to get your children prepared for the camp and working with the College to ensure your child attended, and has had the opportunity to grow from this unique experience, is greatly appreciated. Finally, thanks to all students who took part in the camp; your behaviour was outstanding and you all demonstrated significant grit in persevering through tough conditions, well done!




