# From the Principal

#### Relationships

The holiday break allowed me the time to reflect on the incredibly special and privileged relationship that being in a school offers with my colleagues and with so many students and families. There are very few professions that allow you the opportunity to meet and be in relationships, true relationships, with so many people. With this opportunity also exists a very real and important responsibility to ensure that we consistently work hard to firstly establish and then maintain these relationships, particularly in the context of a Catholic school where our very existence should be underpinned by God's love for us and in turn our love for one another.

#### **Decision Time**

In Term 3 these relationships provide the foundation for the critical life decisions that need to be taken by young people and their families. Our Senior School students are currently in the process of subject selection for 2025, whilst our Year 12 students will turn their attention to post-school life and the direction that they wish to take. These can be some of the most important decisions that we make, and it is crucial to be as informed as possible, to ask questions and advice, and for families to engage in constructive and positive dialogue. Of course, the staff of St Francis de Sales College are here to support and guide these decisions as best we can, however it is ultimately up to each student and their family to determine their pathway. I urge all families to actively engage with this process.

#### **Enrolment Demand**

As I have previously mentioned in the *Link Up*, we are experiencing unprecedented demand for enrolment at St Francis de Sales College. As such, I cannot encourage any family more strongly to ensure that if you wish to enrol your children in our College to do so immediately. Positions for many year levels in 2025 are very tight, and enrolment for 2026 and beyond is also filling fast. To give you a sense of the growth, in 2023 we had three classes of Year 7 students, in 2025 it will be at least five classes. This is terrific, as it allows us to offer a range of subjects and pathways in the senior years that may not be possible with fewer enrolments. With the addition of the Dell redeveloped classrooms, dance studio, music, drama and refurbished Performing Arts Centre, the facilities and offerings for our students is extensive and diverse. All credit to the staff of St Francis de Sales for the learning community they continue to build, and thank you, our families for your ongoing confidence and trust in us. The future is indeed very bright.

#### Feast of the Assumption

The Feast of the Assumption of the Virgin Mary that we celebrated yesterday at our Community Mass is an opportunity to reflect on the lives of women in our College and Church communities. We are so fortunate to have had many positive female role models in our church beginning with Jesus' mother Mary. More recently we have had amazing women who have influenced Catholic education in particular and who have lived out their union with Jesus with such clarity and conviction that we can learn so much from them about how to find where God is and who God wants to be for us. # Bullying No Way National week of action 12-16 August 2024

This week commemorates the national week of action against bullying, culminating on Friday with the official national day of action. This year's theme, *Everyone Belongs* fits perfectly with our Heart Values. Students have had the opportunity in Pastoral Care lessons this week to discuss the theme and ways we can continue to celebrate diversity and promote belonging within our community.

It is also timely to remind the community of *Stymie* our anonymous harm reporting tool. Stymie empowers young people to ask for help when they need support, or if they are seeing or experiencing harm. Encrypted, anonymous notifications are delivered within seconds to authorised recipients, who respond according to the College's wellbeing framework and personal responsibility procedures. Students can access the reporting tool via the SEQTA Learn splash page.

#### **College Photos – Uniform and Grooming**

Our sense of community and identity was palpable across the two days of College photos as students from Reception through to Year 12 showed immense pride in their uniform and personal appearance. There is overwhelming evidence that connects a sense of identity and belonging to improved engagement and learning outcomes. For this reason, taking pride in uniform and grooming doesn't just need to occur on photo day! I encourage parents and caregivers to familiarise themselves with the **College Uniform Requirements** to ensure that your child is set for success each and every day.

This is a significant event for students and families, as well as logistically. Thank you to Sarah Sims (Marketing and Communications Coordinator) and Michele McDonald (Coordinator of R-12 Support Team) for their coordination of College photos across two full days. Catch Up Photo Day is scheduled for Tuesday 20 August for students who weren't able to attend last week.

#### Beyond the Classroom – Year Level Camps

Throughout Term 3 and 4, many students and staff in our community get the opportunity to learn beyond the classroom and immerse

themselves in our natural environment.

Our Year 4 students have enjoyed their time at Mylor this week, while our Year 8s will journey to Mt Crawford later this term. We have the information session for the Term 4 Year 7 Canberra Tour next week, and planning is underway for camps in early Term 4 for our Year 5, 6 and 9 cohorts.

College camps form a key component of the curriculum, as well as provide critical opportunities to build a sense of school spirit and community beyond the classroom and the school gates. Information for these events will soon be in circulation and I encourage you to reach out to the respective Year Level Leader if you have any questions.

#### Screen Time at Home

A common topic of conversation that comes up in my interactions with parents is screen time at home. How much is too much? Do children miss out on opportunities for social interaction if they don't get access to a device at home? These are challenging questions to answer, and the truth is, there is are no hard and fast rules. What is important though, is to keep on the look out for warning signs, and to co-construct healthy screen time parameters with your child.

The eSafety Commissioner has some excellent advice for parents and caregivers looking for guidance. Some key information is detailed below:

#### Signs that your child's online activity may be having a negative impact on them or on your family include:

- · less interest in social activities like meeting friends or playing sport
- not doing so well at school
- tiredness, sleep disturbance, headaches, eye strain
- changes in eating patterns
- reduced personal hygiene
- obsession with particular websites or games
- extreme anger when being asked to take a break from online activity
- · appearing anxious or irritable when away from the computer
- becoming withdrawn from friends and family

#### Help your child manage their online time

#### Stay engaged and encourage balance

- Keep an eye on the games, apps and devices your child uses. Chat with your child regularly and help them stay aware of how much time they are spending on different online and offline activities.
- Include positive things outside the online world in your conversations, such as what they love in life, careers they are interested in and new hobbies.
- Join in. Play games together as a family, or explore some joint online projects. Rather than being just a solitary activity, online time can then become another way of strengthening connections as well as building social skills.
- Where possible, avoid limiting online time as a punishment as this approach may inflate its importance to children.

#### Create a plan

- Involve your child in creating a family plan for leisure and entertainment time that balances time spent sitting in front of screens including time online and watching TV and a variety of offline activities.
- Work out the plan together. Young people are more likely to respond to rules they have contributed to and see as being fair and consistent.
- A minor reduction each day or a '15-minutes to switch-off' warning can help the transition to a more balanced use of time.

#### Academic Assemblies

We were delighted to have our families join us for the R-6 and 7-12 Awards Assemblies held in Week 2. These celebrations were important occasions for our College, recognising the outstanding academic achievements of our students from Semester 1, 2024 and highlighting our College's Heart Values. At the **R-6 Heart Badge, SRC and Awards Assembly** students received awards for *Learning Excellence* and *Learning Endeavour* and at the **Years 7-12 Academic Assembly**, students achieved *Academic Excellence in Endeavour* awards based on their Semester 1 results. Another special part of these assemblies was the presentation of the College Heart Value awards, where a student from each year level was acknowledged for living out our 2024 Heart Value of *Wisdom* in their daily interactions with our community during Semester 1. We also welcomed a number of new students and staff to our College, presenting them with their Heart Badge. We congratulate all these award winners and acknowledge all students who are continuing to strive for excellence through their approach and dedication to their studies.

#### NAPLAN

Back in Term 1, students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participated in the NAPLAN tests, which assessed students' proficiencies in reading, writing, language conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy at their year level. Here at the College, we use the results from these assessments to help monitor student progress in their literacy and numeracy skills, using the Australian Curriculum as a reference. NAPLAN reports were sent home during Week 4 to provide information to families about their child's achievement at the time of these assessments. Whilst NAPLAN provides a snapshot of performance in literacy and numeracy, it's important to remember that this is one element regarding students' overall learning and achievement in literacy and numeracy. We invite families to contact the College if you wish to discuss your child's results.

#### National Science Week and National Vocations Awareness Week

We have recently celebrated both National Science Week and National Vocations Awareness Week. This year the Science Week theme of *Species Survival – More Than Just Sustainability* highlighted the importance of science and innovation in ensuring the survival and thriving of different species in our ever-changing world. Our Year 7 students headed to Monarto Zoo to study animal habitats, ecosystems and classification, the Year 8s went on excursion to Science Alive at Wayville Showgrounds, providing them with an opportunity to experience a wide range of STEM careers and interactive exhibits and workshops. And our Year 9s experienced a variety of workshops run by the University of Adelaide.

National Vocation Awareness Week occurs at a time when our Year 9-11 students are beginning their thinking about 2025 subject selections and considering their pathways through and beyond schooling. The recent SACE Information Evening for Years 9-11 students and their parents was a great opportunity to explore this in more depth and it was terrific to see so many students, parents and carers there on the night.

#### Year 7-11 Subject Selection and Counselling

Preparations are well-underway for 2025 subject selections for our current Year 7-11 students. Over the coming weeks students will engage in subject information sessions, and subject counselling will be offered to assist students and families with understanding the specific requirements of SACE and the subjects offered at various year levels. The aim is to ensure everyone is well-informed when making subject selections for 2025. I invite students and families to contact their Homeroom Teacher, Kerin Tinnion (Director of Students 7-12) or Rosslyn Mattner (SACE Coordinator) if further guidance is required.

#### **Book Week**

Next week is Book Week, where we celebrate the power and benefits that reading has from an educational perspective. The 2024 Children's Book Week theme is *Reading is Magic*, and we look forward to celebrating by reading books and better understanding the amazing power books have to transport minds and induce curiosity about the wonders of our world. Throughout Book Week, as always, we encourage our students and their families to enjoy the magic of reading and partake in the wonderful conversations that can stem from engaging with the author's message, the wonder of the illustrations and the powerful way language can embrace and enthral us in a good story. We hope that you have a great Book Week and enjoy the opportunity to 'escape' into a good book, or two or three.

#### **Upcoming Learning Reviews and Tours of Learning**

In Week 7 (Tuesday 3 and Wednesday 4 September) Senior School teachers are looking forward to conversations about your child's 2024 progress during our 7-12 Learning Reviews. Likewise, Junior School families will have an opportunity to attend R-6 Tours of Learning during Week 9 (17 September). These are significant opportunities for teachers, students and parents to collaboratively celebrate successes, review areas for growth and support students in their agency and ownership of their learning. We encourage all parents/caregivers to book times for these events in line with the documentation that has been sent home.

#### Mary challenges us to be Wisdom People

Welcome to Term 3! It was pleasing to begin our term gathered as a whole-College for the Mary MacKillop Mass. Being our first Australian Saint, Mary MacKillop has much to teach us about living our Heart Values and following in the footsteps of Jesus.

At the Mass we were blessed with the presence of Sr Mary Ryan, a Sister of St Joseph, who gave a wonderful and insightful presentation, reflecting on our Heart Value of *Wisdom* and the wisdom of Mary MacKillop and how we can learn from her actions. The parts of her reflection that resonated with me are:

"WISDOM... what does this word mean? A WISDOM, or a WISE person... is a responsible person, someone who is sensible, a thoughtful person, someone who shows good judgement or makes smart decisions, because they've thought before they acted. I'm sure that you've met lots of WISE people, young and old, and that all of you ARE trying to be WISE and share your gift of WISDOM too! I call Mary MacKillop my WISDOM WOMAN! She was WISE... a responsible person, a sensible, thoughtful person who showed good judgement and made smart, WISE decisions.

I'm sure that Mary often asked herself questions like these, so that she could make WISE decisions.

- Who will be affected by my choice/s or actions?
- Will my choice or action make me happy or sad?
- How will my choice or action affect anyone else?
- Will someone or some others be sad or happy because of my choice?

If we wish to be WISDOM PEOPLE, we too, need to ask ourselves questions like these. Think about them! I believe that we can ALL be WISE - or WISDOM PEOPLE - if, like Mary MacKillop, we stop and think before we act or make a choice. Mary, our WISDOM WOMAN, wrote lots of letters to many people. In one of her letters to the Sisters of Saint Joseph, she wrote some very WISE words: "Find happiness in making others happy." And she did just that! If we can, by our choices and actions, make others happy, we too, like Mary MacKillop will also be very happy WISDOM PEOPLE! And that will definitely make our school, or families, Mount Barker and our part of the world a better place!

#### Giving and receiving Mercy

Term 3 is our time to deeply focus on our Mercy Heritage and raise awareness of, and funds for, Mercy organisations who are working with those in most need. We focus on our Mercy Mission Appeal at this time.

Our staff and students will be immersed in all things Mercy in a unique manner this year. Earlier this week, our teaching staff had the pleasure of listening to a presentation by Maddie Kelly, who has an amazing story inspired by her Mercy upbringing at St Aloysius College for her secondary schooling.

At the end of 2016, shortly before completing her degree, Maddie saw St Jude's School featured on a television show and decided to apply for a role as a communications officer in the school's Tanzania-based marketing team. She was awarded the position and moved to Tanzania in May 2017 to commence a two-year contract at St Jude's. At the end of her two years, Maddie felt immersed in the Tanzanian culture and did not feel ready to leave, so Gemma Sisia, the school's founder, gave her the opportunity to transition into a new role and launch the school's Alumni Association. Over the next three years, Madeleine accompanied Gemma on two promotional tours of Australia, and later took on the role of communications and editorial specialist.

Maddie spoke with our staff about how "Mercy is about truly being present to someone in that moment – totally focused on that person and 'seeing them'. Mercy becomes a two-way exchange." During her time at St Jude's School, Maddie experienced and witnessed many people in deep poverty and in desperation to receive quality education. She was part of a team in Tanzania who worked tirelessly to support young people and families to achieve their educational goals, which would hopefully lead them to live a life of freedom and choice. Maddie said "I felt I was shielded by what I knew of Mercy during my upbringing. St Aloysius College gave me so many experiences of social justice, where I was exposed to people in great need and I was able to respond to the young people at St Jude's School in a manner that helped them to 'be seen'".

This presentation by Maddie, was an introduction for our staff, to the Staff Reflection Day that we will attend on 6 September. This Staff Reflection Day is quite special, as it is the first time that the staff from all three Mercy affiliated schools in South Australia will be gathering together for a such an event. The theme is Mercy focused and we will be reflecting on our histories, our current realities, and the potential connections with each other as we move into the future. We look forward to this time of reflection and connection with people who share our Mercy charism.

We are very fortunate to have Maddie Kelly and Sr Meredith (a Sister of Mercy) facilitate our Year 8 Reflection Day, which is being held in Week 6. The Year 8s will explore what Mercy means in their life, take part in a walk in Adelaide which will highlight key agencies who are doing works of mercy, and put together care packs for Mercy care agencies to use with those in need.

Students, families and staff are encouraged this term to donate non-perishable canned food items to our Mercy Mission Appeal. Our focus on Mercy will culminate on Tuesday 24 September, which is International Mercy Day. On this day, each year level will gather with all of the canned food they have collected and work at building a creative 3D Artwork with the cans. This will be fun, energising, healthy competition and provide an opportunity for awareness-raising of Mercy works. After this event the canned food items will be donated to

#### Year 10 Reflection Day

#### **Student Reflection**

On Tuesday 6 August the Year 10s went to The Village Well at Aldgate for their Reflection Day, focusing on making meaningful connections and living to our full potential. The day was run by two presenters from Real Talk. The day was broken into three sessions addressing different themes and topics.

The first session was on relationships with others, yourself and your body. This session allowed for us to contribute and share ideas. We were also asked to reflect on what stood out to us and to discuss this in small groups.

The next session involved students competing in a scenario-based learning activity. Situations like consent, alcohol, parties, and safety were covered. We were able to talk through what you do in dangerous situations and share opinions on the matter whilst also competing against others to get the most points.

In the third session, we were split into two groups. The girls wrote letters about what they admired and appreciated about each other, and then later followed by discussions on issues that arise with social media becoming a rising normality. Whilst this was happening the boys discussed similar topics of social media and ran a competition to further elaborate on this topic.

Something that stood out to me was the presenter's ability to convey messages in a variety of ways, from showing people's perspectives on the same issue with a game of charades, sharing experiences to build confidence and linking everyday issues to topics that are more applicable for our age group. I really enjoyed how this Reflection Day linked into our current religion assignment addressing topics about how to live life to it's fullest and the big idea's of life.

Overall this was an educational experience that allowed us to learn about relationships and life in a very creative way.

# 7-12 Highlights



#### Year 7 Monarto Zoo Excursion

Year 7 students recently visited Monarto Safari Park as an outdoor learning experience to enhance their understanding of the Science topic Ecosystems. Students were taken on a guided tour focusing on how Monarto Safari Park has worked on providing a natural simulation of habitats and animal enrichment. The highlights of the bus tour were seeing the development of the new elephant habitat, spotting the newest born giraffe and the hyenas getting very close to the bus. Students were able to walk around to closely observe the behaviour of meerkats, rock-wallaby's and chimpanzees. The keeper information talk at the chimpanzees inspired students to think about how recycling mobile phones can reduce the need to mine for minerals that would otherwise destroy the habitats of the chimpanzees.

#### **Science Alive**

On Friday 3 August the Year 8 students attended the Science Alive Big STEM Day out at Wayville Showgrounds. Students were able to choose their activities and participated in a range of hands-on learning experiences, including the Australian Electronic Sports League Competition where they learnt about safe online competition and social groups while playing against each other and students from other schools. Some students participated in the bridge building competition and others in the catapult competition. Along with lots of other interactives the Year 8s experienced the importance of environmental sciences and conservation while interacting with living animals,

insects and snakes and virtual reality tours snorkelling the Great Barrier Reef. Finally, students immersed themselves in future technologies and careers, programming robots, flying drones, and learning about the electric cars, the industry that supports them and the future careers opportunities.

#### Stage 1 Earth and Environmental Science Flinders University Groundwater Excursion

On Friday 3 August, the Stage 1 Earth and Environmental Science students embarked on an excursion to Flinders University to participate in a groundwater experiment. The day began with a Careers in STEM presentation by the Flinders University STEM Outreach Team, where students discovered a wide range of career opportunities in Earth and Environmental Sciences. After the presentation, we moved to the Earth Science laboratory, where students engaged in a collaborative experiment using a groundwater model. This handson activity allowed students to gather and analyse data, investigating the movement of water through an aquifer and examining the effects of pollution on groundwater. Students were able to apply their classroom knowledge to real-world scenarios, enhancing their understanding of how groundwater systems function and the environmental challenges they face. Overall, the trip provided a valuable and engaging learning experience, inspiring our students to consider future careers in STEM fields and deepening their appreciation for the importance of environmental science.
