From the Principal

It is incredible to think that we have already arrived at Week 8. It has been a rich and rewarding term already, with a plethora of events, learning and faith experiences. I am continually amazed at the breadth and depth of what is offered to our students, and always delight in the enthusiasm they bring to our community.

In the past week our Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students have been participating in NAPLAN. Whilst we all know that NAPLAN is only one measure of student performance, it is nevertheless an important one. Our College utilises the data to support both individual students, and cohorts of students to implement programs and intervention strategies to improve all students literacy and numeracy skills. At St Francis de Sales College I believe we have a great balance between understanding the importance of NAPLAN and wanting our students to do their very best, without placing undue pressure on them to perform. As I often say, all I or any of our staff can ask of the young people in our care is their best effort. That will always be enough.

On Friday of Week 5 we held our Year 11 and 12 Formal at the Adelaide Festival Centre. It can be a little wearing at the end of a long week to then have to supervise a school event on a Friday night, but I can honestly say it was one of the best evenings I have been to of this type. Our students shone both in the way they presented themselves, and the way they represented the College, and it was truly a fantastic event. Thank you to all the staff who gave of their time to supervise, and a massive thank you to Ros Mattner and Bianca Evans who organised the Formal. It has been a highlight of the year so far.

I continue to be both amazed and pleasantly surprised by the unprecedented enrolment demand that we are witnessing for our College. This speaks volumes of the community that we are privileged to be a part of, and the people who have worked so hard to build an inclusive and faith filled community. As a result, our key intake years of Reception and Year 7 are nearing capacity. Indeed, some of our primary year levels are full and now have waiting lists. We will be making decisions about our class structures for 2026 very soon and therefore, if you, or someone you know is seeking enrolment at our College I cannot stress enough the importance of completing an enrolment form as soon as possible.

We are currently in the middle of the Lenten season, the 'Holy Springtime', during which time Catholic's are preparing for the most important liturgical event of the year, our Easter celebrations. I was fortunate enough to spend some time at the Year 10 Coorong camp a few weeks ago where I witnessed our students pushing their own boundaries and stepping out of their comfort zones. More often than not, it is through the encouragement and assurance of being in community that allows us to safely reach beyond the boundaries of our comfort zone. This was certainly the case as our students kayaked long distances, hiked through sand dunes and surfed the Goolwa swell.

It was a pleasure also to attend the Year 11 and 12 Formal at the Adelaide Festival Centre recently. The event was a raging success – in fact the best school formal I have ever attended. It was a genuine community event, made richer by the presence of so many parents at the beginning and end of the evening.

Harmony Day 2025

Annually, the 21 March in Australia is a day that we recognise that diversity is at the heart of our nation's identity. The same is true for our College community, evidenced through our Heart Values of Respect, Compassion and Justice; and our desire for every member of our community to belong for life.

We celebrated Harmony Day through writing chalk affirmations for students around the campus, art and cultural activities led by student leaders, and various learning activities in the classroom.

Harmony Day invites us all to consider what diversity means in our own context. For our College, we regard diversity as encompassing all learners across cultural, academic, social, emotional, personal and physical attributes. As Pope Francis says, "an inclusive education finds a place for all!"

Student Consultation - Wellbeing, Personal Responsibility and Pastoral Care

Early next term, every student in our College community will have the opportunity to have their say on wellbeing, developing personal responsibility and pastoral care. Each Homeroom will participate in the schoolwide student consultation where students will identify what elements of student wellbeing we should 'keep', 'stop' and 'start' in our community.

As has been previously communicated, we are currently developing a new Personal Responsibility Procedure to be launched in Semester 2, and also scoping and sequencing a Reception to Year 12 Pastoral Care program. The voice and agency of our young people is critical in this process and we look forward to the contribution of each student in our community.

Cyber Safety

We are currently securing dates for cyber safety sessions for middle school students, and a seminar for parents. Young people and adults are becoming increasingly present in, and reliant on the cyber world, yet the risk has never been higher.

We provide a number of learning opportunities to all students about their online identity and the dangers associated with the cyber world, but many of the risks that they face are beyond the school gates. To this end, it is critical that parents and caregivers have a high awareness of what their children are accessing online. Establishing boundaries and promoting healthy habits when it comes to screen time is also crucial.

Further information will be communicated in the coming weeks about these cyber safety sessions.

Term 2 Uniform Preparation

A reminder that from the beginning of Term 2, students in Years 7-12 are required to wear their winter uniform to school. We encourage parents and caregivers to plan ahead to ensure that students are ready to adhere to our uniform expectations from the first day of Term 2.

Winter (Terms 2 and 3)

College blazer (Years 7-12) for formal occasions, including assemblies and excursions. The blazer is to be worn to and from the
College, regardless of method of transport, in Term 2 and Term 3. The jumper or blue spray jacket may only be worn as the outer
garment once inside the College grounds. The blazer is to be worn to Homeroom Admin.

- College skirt (to be worn at or just below the knee) or with College long sleeved shirt (tucked in) and College blue knee high socks
 or navy blue tights.
- College charcoal grey trousers with green/white long sleeved striped shirt (tucked in) and plain charcoal socks.
- College bottle green V-necked jumper, navy jumper (Years 10-12)
- Plain black lace up school shoes (not canvas style) or buckled, black, leather, school shoes.
- College blue spray jacket (R-12) College tie (Years 7-12).

As we reach the midpoint of Lent, I'm very much looking forward to our students engaging in Holy Week activities towards the end of the term. One thing I've admired throughout my time at our College is the students' sense of occasion and reverence, particularly in liturgy.

The Passion of Jesus is often a strong connection point for our students and their faith, primarily because it reinforces a valuable life lesson – that suffering is part of the human condition. Each of us suffer through the routine of life, and we shouldn't be afraid to seek the support of our community in times of suffering. As we move towards Easter, we are reminded of how quickly our darkness can turn to light. There is a message here for our perspective of wellbeing.

Finally, as the seasons change and we move into the cooler months, I'd like to take the opportunity to remind families to be mindful of cold and flu like symptoms, and to stay away from school if you are feeling unwell. This is critically important to stop the spread of many respiratory illnesses.

Wishing our community good health and wellbeing in the weeks ahead.

From the Deputy Principal - Learning

Excellence and Equity

The Alice Springs (Mparntwe) Education Declaration of 2019, spoke of the concept of equity and excellence in education, incorporating an understanding that all young people are confident, creative lifelong learners and highlighting a commitment to realising the potential of every student. In a similar fashion, the core component of Catholic Education South Australia's Living Learning Leading Framework is that all students are 'thriving people, capable learners, leaders for the world God desires', an understanding that drives our College's desire to know, value and understand each of our students.

Throughout this term our College focus on Excellence and Equity has been evident in several ways, with our Class/Homeroom/Subject teachers focused on:

- creating classroom environments that promote a sense of belonging, welcome, inclusivity and accessibility
- · ensuring that they know each of our students and their individual learning needs
- monitoring progress to ensure that students are on track for positive learning outcomes
- setting high expectations and processes to ensure each student is provided with appropriate levels of support
- differentiating by using a range of pedagogical approaches, content methodologies and assessment types.

As you know, our 2025 College Heart Value focus is Justice. The concept of Justice speaks straight to the heart of equity and excellence. What constitutes excellence is different for every student, as they each have varying abilities, goals and projected pathways through and beyond school. Likewise, the supports that each individual student requires to help them achieve to the best of their ability also varies. So, differentiation of content, teaching methods and assessments is an essential task for our teachers in ensuring equity for our students.

It's been wonderful to see the enthusiasm, energy, and commitment that our students, staff, and families have shown towards the many learning opportunities that Term 1 has offered so far. As is to be expected, some learning may have come more easily, some learning has been more challenging requiring students to persevere and persist with more difficult concepts, and some learning remains a continuing goal into Term 2 or beyond.

Regardless, all our students have engaged in positive learning experiences that are helping shape them into wise young people who can thrive in their relationships and in the world. This is something we all desire for our students.

School Attendance and High Learning Outcomes

There are a variety of complex factors that may contribute to student absenteeism, but regardless of the reasons, the link between regular school attendance and high student learning outcomes is clear.

Regular attendance is crucial to maximising each student's learning growth and every day that a student misses from school matters, as regular absenteeism contributes to an accumulative and compounding negative effect on learning engagement and outcomes.

Whilst students who are sick do need to stay home, other absences from school are unacceptable, including:

- Truancy
- Students selectively opting out of school activities and events
- · Students taking time out of school to catch up on assessments
- Students avoiding assessment tasks or assessment deadlines.

Other absences from school require parents/caregivers to apply to the Principal for an exemption from school, but should also be kept to a minimum as much as possible, these include:

- Family travel or holidays during the school term
- Student exchange programs
- · Longer term medical or health reasons.

As usual, parents/caregivers are asked to contact us to explain student absences. Should a student absence be unexplained, parents/caregivers will be sent a message asking them to substantiate the reason for the student's non-attendance.

To maximise student learning outcomes, it is important that our College, parents/caregivers and students work collaboratively to help ensure students are at school and engaging proactively and positively in their classes. Should you have any concerns about your child's attendance at school, please reach out to your Homeroom/Class teacher in the first instance.

2025 NAPLAN Testing

Congratulations to all our Year 3, 5, 7, and 9 students who have completed their NAPLAN Tests over the past few weeks. Thanks also to their teachers and the Directors of Learning (R-6 and 7-12) for their exemplary organisation and support during the testing period.

We look forward to receiving the NAPLAN results earlier than previous years, providing teachers with more time to consider these results alongside other assessments to further inform teaching and learning programs, enhance support for individual students, and prioritise areas of strength and improvement.

Results will be sent home to families as soon as possible after we receive them.

Learning Reviews - Wednesday 19 and Thursday 20 March

We have just completed our first set of Learning Reviews for 2025. These meetings are a great example of our College's Learning Pillars in action. They involve students, parents/guardians, and teachers coming **together** to discuss the knowledge, skills, and approaches students are **discovering** through their learning, and setting future-oriented learning goals to ensure student **growth** and high academic outcomes.

Thank you to all parents/caregivers who took the opportunity to meet with teachers during these learning reviews, and a special thank you to the students who engaged positively by discussing their learning knowledgeably and confidently.

If you missed the opportunity to attend these learning reviews or were unable to book a meeting with a teacher you wished to see, please email them to arrange an opportunity for feedback.

SEQTA and Seesaw

Learning Reviews are **one way** our College keeps families updated on student progress. Additionally, teachers use SEQTA and Seesaw (in some Junior School classes) to communicate and provide feedback to students about their learning and areas for improvement.

All families should now have access to SEQTA Engage, and those with students in Reception to Year 3 should have access to Seesaw. These platforms enable a continuous flow of information between students, families, and teachers regarding student progress in each learning area.

I strongly encourage parents and caregivers to regularly check these platforms to monitor your child's academic progress throughout the year. Use this information to discuss classroom activities, upcoming assessments, and teacher feedback with your child.

If you have any concerns or questions about your child's academic progress, please contact their Class/Homeroom teacher or the relevant subject teacher in the first instance.

Lent

We are well underway within the Season of Lent, as our attention more intentionally shifts to reflecting deeply on the areas of our life that we need to work on, and working at building better relationships with ourselves, others and God. It is a time of intentional prayer, fasting and assisting others in need. In our usual fashion, our College celebrated Shrove Tuesday with a Pancake Breakfast, served as students entered the College gates. This was our first fundraising activity for the Caritas Project Compassion Appeal, and as a College we managed to raise \$692.80 on the day. The next day, our Ash Wednesday liturgy was held and Fr Philip beautifully explained the purpose of Lent and our call to be attentive to the needs of others and take action to make things right.

Our College was very fortunate to participate in the Adelaide Archdiocese official Project Compassion Launch, at St Bernadette's School in the suburb of St Marys. A Mass was held at the College, celebrated by Archbishop Patrick O'Regan, which was attended by a small group of our staff members and students. This was a very special celebration and during the proceedings, our College was named as the host school to officially launch Project Compassion for the Archdiocese, next year. What a wonderful honour.

As we continue to journey through Lent, a reminder of some key pieces of information: Rory's School Lunches have introduced a Lent Menu for Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent (except for Friday 11 April). Also, at our College, the sharing or gifting of Hot Cross Buns and/or Easter Eggs should only happen after Easter, which would be in Week 1 of Term 2.

In Week 11 this term, all students (R-12) will take part in a Stations of the Cross walk, within the hill of the Kookaburra Nest play area. This will be conducted class-by-class in a staggered manner over a number of days. This will provide an opportunity for students to

immerse themselves in the story of the Passion of Jesus, in a manner that gives them a small glimpse of the hardships Jesus faced, in their walking through the steep undulating land on the hill. This year, Martin Gray's senior Drama class will perform at two of the Stations to further enhance the experience for our students. We thank Martin and his students for this.

Project Compassion (Caritas)

The Project Compassion Appeal has a two-fold aim for our College community. Firstly, its about awareness-raising of the great struggles and challenges that so many people in our world face on a daily basis. Year 7 Reflection Day

Following the theme of *Care for our Natural World*, our Year 7s recently participated in their Reflection Day at Laratinga Wetlands, focused on building relationship with our natural world. We drew upon the Bible verse from Matthew 6, and also the wise words of David Attenborough, to frame the intentions of our day.

"Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them". (Matthew 6:26)

"No one will protect what they don't care about; and no one will care about what they have never experienced." (David Attenborough)

The students worked in House Teams for the day and rotated through four practical based activities that gave them the opportunity to build connections with the natural world through various lenses. I ran an art activity that involved collecting rubbings from a diverse range of natural textures found within the Laratinga Wetlands. We were also fortunate to have three guest presenters run activities too. Kim Thompson ran the Wetlands Walk which included wildlife identification and water sample collection. David Booth facilitated a presentation about Aboriginal connection to Country and Zara from Wilbur's Wildlife brought in native Australian animals, which she gave information about and then let the students hold. I thank the presenters and our College staff involved in the day. It was a very engaging and interactive experience for the students, which placed importance on the message within the Pope's encyclical, Laudato Si.

Feast of St Joseph

On Wednesday 19 March, we celebrated the Feast of St Joseph, the steadfast guardian of Jesus and spouse of Mary, mother of Jesus. The Gospels record no words from him. However, Joseph's actions speak volumes, his unwavering faith, obedience to God's call, and humble strength make him one of the most inspiring figures in Scripture. As the earthly father of Jesus, St Joseph lived a life of quiet sacrifice, diligent work, and deep trust in God's plan. On this Feast Day, we honour him not just as the spouse of Mary and earthly father of Jesus, but as a model of virtue, faithfulness, and the kind of steadfast love that shapes families and communities.

It is the qualities of this man that resonated so much with Mary MacKillop, our first Australian Saint. Mary MacKillop established the Religious Congregation called the Sisters of Saint Joseph, due to the qualities and characteristics of St Joseph, which encapsulated all that she wanted the Sisters of St Joseph to be.

Our Year 11 students recently went on an excursion to the Mary MacKillop Precinct in Kensington, as part of their Stage 2 Spiritualities, Religion and Meaning (SRM) course. The Precinct includes the Mary MacKillop Museum, Chapel that Mary MacKillop lived and worshipped in, and the Mary MacKillop Walk through Kensington. The excursion provided much of the information and imagery that the students need to complete their assessment task. We are grateful to Sr Mary Ryan who facilitated the day for us, and tailor made her presentation to align with the Stage 2 SRM assessment task. As well as being immersed in all of the artefacts, photos and information at the Museum, it was such a special time to physically be in the place that St Mary MacKillop lived, worked, ministered, and prayed. She was a very special woman who truly lived the Heart Values that we aspire to at our College.

I wish you well through our Lenten Season and the remaining weeks of this term.

Daily reading at home is a powerful tool that will support your child reach their academic potential.




