# From the Acting Principal

Welcome to the first *Link Up* for Term 2. It has been a busy and productive start to the term, with students engaged in a diverse array of learning opportunities both within and outside the classroom.

Generations in Jazz in Mount Gambier was back for the first time in a couple of years, and we were pleased to be able to provide the opportunity for our performers to take part from 5 to 7 May. We were represented by a highly talented group of musicians and they performed in a manner that reflected very positively on themselves and our College community. Thanks to Sarah Dodd, Emily Lovelock and Gavin McGlaughlin for supporting our students at this important music event.

Our Year 10 cohort were recently engaged in a **Careers Expo and Buddha House Excursion**. This excursion gave the students the opportunity to speak directly with representatives of over 130 Training Organisations and Employers, to gain free career advice and attend various career seminars. Following the Careers Expo, the group moved on to Buddha House to continue work on their current Stage 1 Assessment Task looking at symbolism, diversity and religions.

On Friday 12 May our Year 6 Student Leaders, Peter Nguyen, Evan Sanders, Trinity Werts, Aiden Storr, Chelsea England and Kai Doyle travelled to St Michaels School at Beverley for the **SACPSSA and ACHPERSA Student Leadership Workshop**. ### Generations in Jazz



Early Friday morning in Week 1 of this term, 12 of our Music students set off to Mt Gambier to compete in one of Australia's most regarded Jazz festivals and competitions, Generations in Jazz (GiJ). The students competed against schools from around Australia in two categories; *Small Jazz Combo (deGroove*, directed by instrumental teacher Karen Redman) and Division 3 *Vocal Ensemble (JazZone*, directed by secondary music teacher Sarah Dodd). Despite the wintery, wet and muddy conditions, the weekend was packed full of concerts and performances by world class musicians, fantastic workshops led by instrumental/vocal specialists, and opportunities to create community.

Due to the impact of COVID in recent years, for the majority of students, this was their first performance in front of a live audience. Both ensembles performed so well, and have shown great development and growth in their musicianship and playing in the lead up to the event. 
