From the Principal

It has been such a delight these past few weeks to be able to visit a number of classrooms, assemblies, sporting events, the Sacraments of Confirmation and First Eucharist, and the fantastic Dance performance *#one – It's a Sweet Disposition*. At each of these, I am overwhelmingly struck by the engagement of our students, and the care and effort of our staff. It is a privilege to see our students flourishing in every aspect of their education, and the sense of community is so strong. An example of this growth is being with the R-2 neighbourhood as a Reception class leads an assembly for the first time. The sense accomplishment when these young people lead prayer, read and display their work in front of a large gathering is so heartening to see. The pride and joy on the faces of a parent who witnesses the growth and courage of their child is beautiful. I am very lucky to be able to witness these moments every day here at St Francis de Sales College, and I thank the staff who continually provide these opportunities of learning and faith experience to the young people in our care.

These past few weeks the College leadership have been conducting a number of enrolment interviews and College tours. It makes me so proud as Principal to hear time and time again the wonderful reputation that St Francis de Sales College has in the community. For many new enrolments, the positive word of mouth from current families is the key factor in their decision to come to our school. Thank you all for your continued support of our endeavours to provide rich learning and faith opportunities for your children. Your support is greatly valued.

Given the unprecedented demand for places at our College, I simply cannot stress enough the importance of any family that wishes to enrol their children here at St Francis de Sales to do so as a matter of urgency. We have very limited vacancies in certain years levels including Year 7 for 2025, but these are filling very fast.

On Wednesday of Week 6, our Year 11 students attended the MFS Road Awareness Program. This is a hard hitting yet very important education program for young drivers. I went to the session and was both surprised and delighted to see that Kym Inglis was a key presenter. Many of you would be aware that Kym is a former parent whose beautiful family, wife Melania and daughters Claudia and Logan, along with their friend Georgia were all tragically killed in a motor vehicle accident on 12 January 2010. This tragedy is the most impactful event for me personally in my over 30 years in education, as I am sure it was for many staff. Among the many things that I remember about that time, was the strength of this community in the way it supported each other. Kym Inglis is an incredible man, and his story of grief and resilience is one that I am certain our Year 11s will remember for many years to come.

From the Deputy Principal - Community and Wellbeing

We have reached the halfway point of the academic year, and there is certainly a healthy buzz of busyness throughout our learning environments as students finalise assessments. It is business as usual for our Year 12s as they gear up for what will be the final term of classes.

Schools should always be busy places – it's hard to imagine it any other way! But we recognise that at the end of reporting periods, there can be an increased level of stress and anxiety on our young people, and it has been fantastic to witness the level of care and support offered by our Homeroom teachers, Year Level Leaders and Wellbeing staff.

Pastoral Care

I've had the pleasure of conducting a number of enrolment interviews in recent weeks for families joining our community in 2025. A common question that I ask, and is also asked of me, is "*what sets St Francis de Sales apart from other schools in the area?*" In theory, the answer is somewhat simple; we are a Catholic school in the Mercy tradition. But what does this mean in practice? The most tangible

example is in the pastoral care of our students. We believe in the holistic education of young people, where learning takes place through the heart, soul, body and mind. While academic learning is our core business, it is one part of our educational pursuit.

Throughout the last few weeks, there have been a number of learning opportunities beyond the academic curriculum that have supported the growth and development of our young people.

Mt Barker National Reconciliation Week Event – our first nations students joined members of the Mt Barker community for a reconciliation event during National Reconciliation Week building connections to culture and country.

World Environment Day – Staff and students across the College took part in tree planting in our nature play spaces in an act of solidarity and care for our common home.

MFS Road Awareness Program (RAP) – delivered to our Year 11 students, the RAP program gave an open and honest insight into the experience of firefighters working in road crash rescue. It empowered our students to use positive peer pressure to alleviate risk taking behaviour on the road.

Empower Education '#Adulting' and 'Alert, but not Alarmed' – These sessions explored the transition to adulthood and encouraged them to make great choices, and to look after themselves and their mates through risk taking situations.

SAPOL Cyber Safety and Bullying Sessions – Our students in the middle years spent time with local police officers learning about cyber safety and the implications of illegal online behaviour. The consequences of bullying, harassment, and violent behaviour were also explored through the lens of the law and our students were informed of their role in keeping themselves and others safe.

What is your child accessing online?

There has been a significant amount of media attention in recent weeks regarding the impact of social media on childhood development. It is a timely reminder for parents and caregivers to consider what social media sites are being accessed by your children, and whether they are of an age to navigate the platform safely.

The vast majority of social media platforms currently have a minimum age of 13, and it has been well documented that the state government is lobbying for the minimum age to be lifted to 14 with local measures in place to monitor and police social media access. However, there are many online games that have a chat forum associated with them that are not bound by minimum age laws, nor are they equipped with appropriate controls to mitigate the risk of harmful or illegal online behaviour.

To support the work that we do at the College in teaching safe online behaviour through the Child Protection Curriculum, I would encourage all of our families to have a transparent conversation about what social media and gaming platforms are being accessed online, and for parents and caregivers to ensure they have absolute oversite of when and how these platforms are being used. The eSafety Commissioner website also has excellent advice and resources to support families in navigating this unfamiliar terrain of social media and child development.

Keeping our community healthy

As we rapidly enter the winter period, a reminder to please ensure that your child does not attend school if they have any cold or flu like symptoms. This is best practice to ensure our community stays healthy, particularly those who are immunocompromised.

All the best for the remainder of Term 2.

A huge thank you to our VET Coordinator, Katie Oliver who together with Sarah Bolt (AHSP Alliance Administrator), did the lion's share of organising this fantastic opportunity for our students.

VET options are an important part of many students' senior secondary educational programs. Students at St Francis de Sales can do VET courses as part of the SACE and these pathways are increasingly popular with our Years 10-12 students, as they match these educational pursuits to their strengths, interests and future pathways. VET programs complement the skills, knowledge and dispositions developed through other SACE subjects, as well as providing industry-specific knowledge and skills, and pathways to work or further education.

It is terrific to see an increasing number of our students taking up the opportunity to support their completion of the SACE Certificate by undertaking VET courses. In Semester 2 we have twenty eight Years 10-12 students who are taking the opportunity to access a range of fourteen different VET courses.

Exams and Upcoming Reports

This week students from Years 9 to 11 have engaged in Semester 1 exams. These exams form an important part of assessment programs, but also serve as opportunities to practice and refine exam preparation and exam protocols prior to completing examinable Year 12 subjects.

As we approach the end of Semester 1, exams and other summative assessments are being finalised before reports are distributed on the last day of Term 3. I remind parents/caregivers to continue to access SEQTA for ongoing information about your child's learning. Reports will again be distributed via the SEQTA platform, so if you are currently having any issues with SEQTA Engage, please contact the College for support.


Thank You

Faith in Action (FIA)

This term our FIA Group have been working closely with myself, Jade (Youth Minister), Sr Shiji (Chaplain), and teachers Devan Chalmers, Stephanie Hocking and Tim Dornan. The group meets fortnightly at lunchtimes to learn more about faith and how we can use Gospel values to serve others in our community.

In Term 2 the FIA Group have been exploring meaning within the scripture passage which outlines the 'Works of Mercy'. It is from Matthew's Gospel.

Scripture:

³⁴ Then the King will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, O blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; ³⁵ for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, ³⁶ I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me.' ³⁷ Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see thee hungry and feed thee, or thirsty and give thee drink? ³⁸ And when did we see thee a stranger and welcome thee, or naked and clothe thee? ³⁹ And when did we see thee sick or in prison and visit thee?' ⁴⁰ And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me.'

We have used the core messages in this scripture passage to help raise awareness of people in great need during our Vinnies Winter Appeal. Some of our FIA Group members have taken this into action by accepting the invitation to cook food in our Food Tech kitchen, for Vinnies Fred's Van. I sincerely thank Teagan Rickman and Sr Shiji for assisting with this food making. Stage 1 Biology Class visit to Cleland Wildlife Park

Our Stage 1 Biology students recently visited Cleland Wildlife Park. They learnt about threats to survival of Australia's endemic species and conservation strategies. Students also learnt about human impact on biodiversity and investigated the interrelated factors of an ecosystem, relationships between organisms and identified keystone species and consequences on ecosystems of their decline.

Student Reflection

"On Monday of Week 11 the Stage 1 Biology class visited Cleland Wildlife Park where we learnt about biodiversity and conservation of endangered species. As a participant I learnt about the importance of keeping our native wildlife safe and respected. We adventured around the park and made discoveries for ourselves about endangered species of South Australia and strategies for their conservation. We were able to learn from an educator about the importance of biodiversity and solutions to protect species. In groups we got the opportunity to investigate the many interrelated factors of an ecosystem and the relationships between organisms. Environmental and Earth Science Fossil Field Trip

The Year 11 Earth and Environmental Science class went on an expedition on Tuesday 4 June as part of our coursework on the stories that rocks can tell us about Earth's history. Our first stop was Port Willunga where we located evidence of fossils and looked for features that could tell us about the environment that the fossils lived in. We then travelled to Hallett Cove, which is one of the best geological sites in Australia. Here we looked for evidence of ancient glaciation amongst the geological formations. One of the highlights was The Sugarloaf which is composed of sediments deposited in a lake formed as the ice sheet melted about 280 million years ago.

Overall, it was a fun and educational day that brought our classroom studies to life and deepened our appreciation for the history recorded in the Earth's geology.

Shark Tank eSchool and MIELAB Competition

Throughout the semester the Stage 1 Business Innovations has been integrated within the Shark Tank eSchool and MIELAB, an initiative of Adelaide University. Students worked collaboratively using the Design Thinking Process to identify a problem and create an innovative solution.

A variety of team prototypes were iterated including the Chillowcase, H2O Trakr, and Splatoff.

Our team created Traffic Buddy, a multifunctional traffic app that incorporates social media that notifies your commitments such as work and school if you are caught in traffic and deemed to be late. The point of difference being social media, when friends and other users inform each other of the traffic issue, whether it be in a car, on a bus or walking.

On Tuesday 18 June, we participated in the National Shark Tank eSchool finals competing against interstate schools in the environmental category. Traffic Buddy and its business model were pitched to a panel of university judges, and we were excited to be awarded first place, winning a prize of \$750.

Studying Business Innovations this semester has been fun, challenging, and a great way to collaborate with others – especially if you wouldn't normally work with them.

MFS Road Awareness Program
