Dan Cregan, and Federal Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie.

Our students had a great deal to say about some of the key issues affecting them in the local community including public transport access to universities, ensuring that infrastructure and roads were meeting the needs of our growing community, and the importance of student agency in learning. As we come to the end of Week 8 of Term 3, there has been a distinct shift in the seasons. Although still a bit fresh in the mornings, the extra sunshine is certainly welcomed. Our days are noticeably longer and the students are showing a little extra energy and a brighter spring in their step. Spring has arrived!

So much to celebrate in the learning space over the last few weeks! *Book Week* celebrations again culminated in a wonderful parade with R-6 students and staff showcasing their favourite book characters. Some of our talented Years 7-12 students also demonstrated their literary skills in a *Write a Book in a Day* session as part of the festivities.

Last week, students and families from the Years 7-12 learning communities engaged in discussions with teachers during this term's *Learning Reviews*. In the upcoming week, our R-6 students will also get a chance to showcase their learning, insights, and reflections during their *Tour of Learning*. These events provide a forum for parents, students, and teachers to collaborate as co-learners and learning facilitators. Together, they celebrate achievements and set goals to support students on their ongoing learning journeys. If you need to discuss your child's progress further, please reach out to their teacher to arrange a time.

Over the last few weeks you might have heard your child discussing their learning community's "Bump it Up" wall. Students across the College have been actively collaborating with their teachers to create a visual aid that defines clear success criteria for achieving their learning outcomes. This approach encourages student agency by enabling them to self-assess their work, pinpoint areas for improvement, and establish goals for reaching the next level of learning. Although we are in the exploratory stage with this approach, the feedback from both staff and students has been positive.

7-12 Interim Reports for Semester 2 will again be distributed via SEQTA on the last day of term. A reminder that these are progress reports, and do not necessarily represent the final grade for the semester. If you should ever require support with SEQTA access or use, please contact the College and we will we happy to help.

As students across the College engage in various activities like sports, excursions, practicals, investigations, and assignments, we also

recognise that our Year 12 students are at a key stage in their learning journey. Most are finalising assessments and some are gearing up for trial exams. This time calls for a focused approach to revising the year's learning, which often leads to better results compared to last-minute cramming. Some suggestions that may help with completing final assessments and preparing for exams include:

- Study in shorter, more frequent bursts, allowing for "brain breaks" and processing time.
- · Break down tasks and study materials into manageable chunks, celebrating achievements along the way.
- Use visual aids like concept maps to connect and process complex ideas.
- Sleep! You can't pour from an empty cup.

As we enter the time of year when life seems to get busier and faster, it's important to take intentional moments to stop, reflect, and enjoy the present moment. Go gently and have a very blessed end to Term 3.

College Day

A reminder that on Wednesday, 27 September we celebrate College Day.

This is an opportunity for us to celebrate who we are as a College and to acknowledge our patron (St Francis de Sales) and founders (Sisters of Mercy). A wonderful day of fun, connections and celebration.

There are a few things to be mindful of on the day:

- College Day is a **student and staff only event**, so unfortunately parents/carers are not able to attend.
- College Day is our main charity fundraiser for Term 3, with money raised going to Catherine House. Established by the Sisters of
 Mercy in 1988, Catherine House offers crisis, longer term accommodation and support services for women experiencing
 homelessness. All students are required to bring a gold coin to College Day as part of the fundraising for Catherine
 House.
- There will be Stalls and activities available for students on the day. Some of these Stalls and activities will require payment from students to use them or take part in them. Therefore, students will need to bring coins with them for this. As we will not be able to provide floats for the Stalls, students are required to bring \$2, \$1 and 50 cent coins to buy from or partake in the Stalls and

activities. There are 20 Stalls and activities. Money raised by the Stalls and activities will go to the Catherine House fundraiser.

- Inflatable jumping castles will be available inside the Community Sports Centre for use for FREE.
- Sporting and outdoor activities will be available on the Oval for use for FREE.
- We will provide a **sausage sizzle lunch for FREE**, for all students and staff members. Dietary requirements have been taken into consideration.
- At Recess and Lunchtime, Rory's will operate from the Canteen in the Community Sports Centre, for students to purchase food and drinks.
- Sunscreen will be made available for students and staff. Zinc Cream is not allowed to be worn, due to the potential for mess and staining of equipment.
- Students must bring a hat on the day, for protection from the sun.
- There is a dress-up theme to be aware of. All students and staff are strongly encouraged to dress-up in their favourite colour(s) on the day, and College uniform is not required. This theme may be interpreted as favourite single colour, favourite multiple colours, favourite sports team colours, College House Team colour, etc. Students may use coloured hairspray but this must be applied at home, not at the College. To align with our Uniform Policy, all efforts must be made to remove coloured hairspray from hair prior to attending the College on Thursday. Be creative, as there will be prizes for best dressed.

In the afternoon, we had the opportunity to work in smaller groups at one of the workshops, which were weaving, Aboriginal food and artefacts, silk painting, and contemporary dance.

The Staff Reflection Day provided us with the opportunity to make lasting connections with Aboriginal people within our community, who gave us a deeper glimpse into Aboriginal culture and perspectives of the past, present, and future. We aim to maintain our relationship with the presenters from the day, and work with them to enhance various aspects of our curriculum and community works. The Reflection Day certainly gave us a great deal to ponder and reflect upon.

Parent Connections

Our Parent Community Group hosted the Father's Day Stall on Thursday, 31 August on the Junior School deck. Throughout the day, students had the opportunity to purchase items for their dad or father figures. The Stall made a profit of \$979.85, which will go towards College community-works that the Parent Community Group will drive in the near future. 















Become a Knight
