From the Principal

Right to disconnect

At St Francis de Sales College we understand that parent/caregiver engagement goes hand in hand with student wellbeing and success and productive communication with parents/caregivers is an essential feature of a positive school culture.

Digital technologies have greatly assisted in this regard and the use of parent/caregiver information apps, social media (featuring information, highlights and achievements), school website, SEQTA and the use of email communication directly with staff is now routine.

We appreciate that parent/caregiver expectations of staff accessibility have evolved in the context of enhanced digital communication practices. While representing efficient modes of communication, the breadth of digital communication options can create 'availability creep' where school employees become more accessible in locations and at times of the day, weekends and during periods of leave when they should be able to disconnect from work. Indeed, recent laws have taken effect which provide school employees a right to disconnect.

In the interests of respecting the rights of our staff and recognising the importance of facilitating and promoting healthy communication, we are introducing the following as standard protocol during term time:

- Noting our staff spend a significant amount of their workday focussing on teaching or other activities applicable to their roles, staff
 will endeavour to respond to parent/caregiver communications requesting a response within 48 hours, or two working days, noting
 staff will discern whether an urgent matter requires a shorter response timeframe; and
- Parents/caregivers are encouraged to contact our main College Administration Office in the first instance for any general information.
- Also a reminder to notify the College of student absences, late arrivals or early departures via our website > Student Absences or
 call our Absentee Line on 8393 1001.

We ask that parents and caregivers be mindful and supportive of the above, and we look forward to continuing to engage in genuine partnership with you and your family.

National Child Protection Week

This week is National Child Protection week, culminating with Safeguarding Sunday on 8 September, an initiative of the Catholic church. This year's theme is *every conversation matters*. As educators our prime concern is for the safety and wellbeing of the young people in our care. Teachers and support staff have hundreds of conversations every day with young people, and we are instinctively aware that young people need a voice and agency.

At St Francis de Sales College, the care and protection of our students is our highest priority, and all staff are trained in child protection. There are several key documents that guide our work including Protective Practices for staff in their interactions with young people;

Responding to Risks of Harm, Abuse and Neglect; and Safeguarding Children and Young People Policy (Archdiocese of Adelaide). In addition, all year levels for R-12 are taught the Keeping Safe: Child Protection Curriculum.

If ever you are concerned about the safety or wellbeing of your children at school, it is important that you contact us so that we can work together to address these concerns.

Staff Reflection Day

Whilst our students were taking a welcome break from school last Friday, our staff were engaged in a Reflection Day with the staff of Mercedes College and St Aloysius College. Our connecting point is that we are all schools that were started by the Sisters of Mercy. It was a fantastic day for our staff to connect with our Mercy charism more deeply. I have been really impressed on my return to St Francis de Sales College to witness the re-connection with our rich Mercy heritage, and it provides such a powerful link to our past as well as opening up possibilities for spiritual growth into the future. We owe a great deal to the Broken Hill Sisters of Mercy who opened our school in 1902. They provide a rich legacy and inspiration for us as we continue the work they started in building a faith and learning community that has at its centre the care for others. Thank you to parents and caregivers for supporting this opportunity for our staff by making alternative arrangements for your children. I know that this is not always an easy task.

This is important as we head towards the end of Term 3 and students finalise their work and assessments prior to the upcoming term break.

Book Week

Book Week took place in Week 5, culminating in our Book Week Parades where students and staff had the opportunity to showcase some of their favourite book characters. Some of our talented Years 7-11 students also demonstrated their literary skills in a Write a Book in a Day competition. Of course, all the Book Week events and activities had the purpose of highlighting the importance of developing our literacy skills through reading, an excellent educational lesson and one we should all continue pursuing regularly within our day to day lives.

Learning Reviews and Tours of Learning

A big thank you to all the parents/caregivers, staff and students who participated in the recent Years 7-12 Learning Reviews. Likewise, Junior School families will have an opportunity to attend R-6 Tour of Learning during Week 9 (Tuesday 17 September). These are significant events, providing a forum for staff, students and parents/caregivers to work side by side, celebrating achievements, identifying growth opportunities and setting goals to support students on their ongoing learning journeys. It has been pleasing to see our Years 7-12 students demonstrating their agency and ownership of their learning and, no doubt, the Junior School students will also engage enthusiastically and knowledgably in showcasing their learning next week.

Year 12 Students

Our Year 12's are rapidly approaching the end of their school educational journey. In the last few weeks of Term 3 and the start of Term 4, these students will be busy engaging in trial exams and preparing for final assessments and exams. This time of year, requires an even more focused approach to classes, assessments and revision than the Year 12's have already demonstrated. We wish our Year 12's well during this significant phase of their final school year. To help create the right mindset and conditions for effective exam preparation and assessment completion, it is worth our Year 12 students considering the following:

- Ditch the distractions: Eliminate distractions, such as phones and social media during study and/or work sessions.
- Study/work in shorter, more frequent bursts: Allowing for "brain breaks" and processing time.
- Break down tasks and study materials into manageable chunks: Celebrate your learning and achievements along the way.
- Use visual aids: Like concept maps and to connect and process complex ideas.
- Sleep well: 8-10 hours per night is an important part of ensuring your brain can effectively retain and process the information you are revising.
- Reward yourself: Maintain a healthy balance of work and recreation.
- Start early: To help ensure your best, begin revising and finalising tasks well in advance.

Diverse Learning Opportunities

Over the last few weeks of Term 3 there is a wide range of learning activities taking place across the College, in and out of the classroom. Our musicians are gearing up for a busy end to the term including the R-7 Instrumental Music Showcase in Week 9 (Wednesday 18 September), the Catholic Schools Music Festival on Tuesday 24 September and a lunchtime Music Lunchbox performance on Wednesday Week 10. We wish them well with these endeavours. Our Year 8 students will be on camp in Week 9, and there is a range of sporting competitions and class excursions leading into the end of term. Our students are blessed to have a diverse choice of learning opportunities and as always, I encourage them to engage in these to the best of their ability and to treasure the knowledge, skills and capabilities they build through their participation.

Year 8 Reflection Day

Student Reflection

"On Tuesday, Week 6, our Year 8 community went off to Adelaide for their Reflection Day. The day was run by two guest speakers in the Cathedral Hall. Sister Meredith Evans (a Mercy Sister) and Maddie Kelly (Old Scholar of St Aloysius College). They told us about the meaning of Mercy and how they have lived it through their lives. We started with a game which I really enjoyed. There were pieces of paper under our chairs, that had on them with unfinished sentences of quotes by Catherine McAuley. Our challenge was to find other people who had other parts of the quote and try to join them together into a sentence.

We also had a little adventure, exploring the Catholic service and care agencies in the City, near Victoria Square. We learned a little bit more about every place we went to and were asked to think about the perspective of homeless people within the city and how they may be shown Mercy in their situation.

Multiple things were incredibly interesting; we learned about Saints and other people who went out of their comfort zone to help those in need. Towards the end of our Reflection Day, we all put together gift packs. We put toiletry items into gift bags with a heartwarming message for families and people who aren't able to afford everyday items, due to their circumstances.

South Australian Medical Imaging Work Experience

On Friday 2 August, Amelia (Milly) (Year 10) and Sienna (Year 11) were given the chance to tour the Medical Imaging department at Flinders Medical Centre with student facilitator, Michael Fuller. Both students had expressed an interest in pursuing a career in Medical Imaging and were hoping to find out more about what is involved to become a Radiographer. With 42 years' experience in Medical Imaging, Michael provided the students with invaluable knowledge and insight into studying radiography and radiology at university, the different streams available within Medical Imaging and the practical skills required to support a successful career. At the end of our tour, Michael was so impressed with Milly and Sienna that he offered them both a day of work experience in the Medical Imaging department – an incredibly rare opportunity! Having this opportunity confirmed for both students that they wanted to pursue this career path, but still felt unsure about working in a hospital setting and preferred the idea of private practice.

Milly completed her work experience on Monday 26 August and Sienna on Monday 9 September. Both students spent the day working between the MRI and Emergency departments, shadowing the student facilitator and meeting staff and university students on placement. Milly even had the pleasure of meeting St Francis de Sales Old Scholar, 2014 graduate Laura Gherghetta, who is now working in the MRI department. During their work experience reflections, both students noted that having the chance to work in a hospital setting and speak to the staff about their own experiences has changed their perspective, and they both now hope to work in an Emergency Department one day.

This opportunity was only possible for these students because of a community connection and highlights how valuable our entire College community is in providing our students with diverse opportunities for learning.

Staff Career Journeys

As part of our Careers program, St Francis de Sales staff were encouraged to share their career journeys with us earlier this year. These stories would then be shared with our senior students to demonstrate that careers can evolve throughout the course of your life.

On Tuesday 10 September, our Year 9 and 10 cohorts had the pleasure of hearing from two of our Junior School teachers, Joanna Handforth and Travis Ireland, regarding their career journey. Joanna and Travis have had very unique and diverse pathways that have led them to teaching, demonstrating to students that even people with the same job may have taken very different paths to get there. Throughout their presentations, Joanna and Travis encouraged our students to see every experience presented to them as an opportunity to grow and learn.

We hope to hear more from our staff community regarding their career journeys and show our students the benefit of broadening their experiences through career exploration.

Week 10, on Tuesday 24 September, our Festival Choir, under the direction of R-6 Music Teacher Nicole Moxham, will join other Catholic Schools and Colleges at the Adelaide Festival Theatre as part of the annual Catholic Schools Music Festival. This is always a fantastic experience for our students and their families and once again, we are certain that our Festival Choir will represent the College with great pride.

Our senior students have been working on a new unit focused on audio engineering. Each student has become an "expert" on specific areas (e.g. microphones, amps and speakers, leads and cables, sound systems) and have presented their research and new skills to the class. They have been experimenting with Equalization (balancing frequencies in sound) of voices and instruments. Their final assessment will be to set up and manage the sound for one of our College ensembles.

We have also had the privilege of having Lucas Pantano (as seen in photo), our Old Scholar (Class of 2021), complete some of his industry placement hours at the College as part of his tertiary studies at the *Tabor Institute of Music*. Lucas has been working with our ensembles at rehearsals, in class with student bands, supporting primary music lessons and presenting engaging presentations about looping!






